

## SOLEMNITY OF SAINT MARY OF THE CROSS (MACKILLOP) - YEAR B

### FIRST READING – 1 Kings: 17: 8-16

#### A reading from the first book of Kings

And then the word of the Lord came to Elijah, 'Up and go to Zarephath, a Sidonian town, and stay there. I have ordered a widow there to give you food.' So he went off to Sidon. And when he reached the city gate, there was a widow gathering sticks. Addressing her he said, 'Please bring a little water in a vessel for me to drink.' She was setting off to bring it when he called after her. 'Please', he said, 'bring me a scrap of bread in your hand.' 'As the Lord your God lives,' she replied, 'I have no baked bread, but only a handful of meal in a jar and a little oil in a jug; I am just gathering a stick or two to go and prepare this for myself and my son to eat, and then we shall die.' But Elijah said to her, 'Do not be afraid, go and do as you have said; but first make a little scone of it for me and bring it to me, and then make some for yourself and for your son. For thus the Lord speaks, the God of Israel:

Jar of meal shall not be spent,  
jug of oil shall not be emptied,  
before the day when the Lord sends  
rain on the face of the earth.'

The woman went and did as Elijah told her and they ate the food, she, himself and her son. The jar of meal was not spent nor the jug of oil emptied, just as the Lord had foretold through Elijah.

### GOSPEL – Matthew 6: 25-34

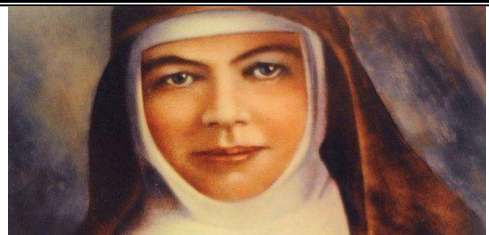
#### A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

Look at the birds in the sky. They do not sow or reap or gather into barns; yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not worth much more than they are? ## News from the Parish Pastoral Council

Like many others, the PPC has found it difficult to hold their monthly meetings during the last 18 months as the Covid Pandemic continues to have such an enormous impact. We have met in person when we can but often our meetings have been cancelled due to lockdown and Covid-related restrictions which is a similar experience to that of many parish groups. Subsequently there has been less activity resulting in little need to share updates with our parish community.

The PPC met on Wednesday 4<sup>th</sup> August via video to discuss, amongst other matters, forthcoming PPC elections which are held at about this time each year (although they were not held in 2020). Two Cluster Representatives have completed their appointment with the PPC and will stand down, effective at the end of August. On behalf of the PPC members, I offer my gratitude to Tyrone Paul (Hospitality Cluster Rep) and Howard Fernandez (Worship Cluster Rep) who have diligently and faithfully represented their clusters and served the PPC wholeheartedly, providing their expertise and years of experience and wisdom. Tyrone has also been the Vice-Chairperson, stepping in to the Chairperson's seat when needed. The PPC is very grateful for the commitment of Tyrone and Howard, not only to the PPC but to the parish as a whole and they are both committed to continuing to serve our community.

With Tyrone's departure, Warren Peters (Service Cluster Rep) has asked to move to representing the Hospitality Cluster. This is fitting as Warren is already an active member of the Social Group and, as members agreed, moving across clusters enables members to build connections with others in our community. There is also a vacancy for a Youth representative. This position will be filled from within the youth community, led by Fr Anil and our current Youth Rep, Kharece D'Souza.

In coming weeks, parishioners will be invited to nominate for the two vacant positions – Service Cluster and Worship Cluster. The election process might need to be altered somewhat, perhaps to an online model, depending on Covid restrictions in coming weeks. Please consider if you, or someone you know in the parish, would like to represent and serve your parish in this unique role of Parish Pastoral Councillor.

### PRAYERS FOR THE SICK:

Privacy legislation requires the **written permission of an authorized person** before any name can be printed. Any list of the sick in the parish bulletin will undergo renewal according to a four week cycle. After four weeks a person's name on the sick list will be removed.



**St. Mary MacKillop**, in full **Saint Mary Helen MacKillop**, also called **Saint Mary of the Cross**, was born on 15<sup>th</sup> January 1842 in Fitzroy to poor Scottish immigrants. When she was 14, Mary began working, and she was often her family's main source of support. In 1860 she moved to the small rural town of Penola to serve as governess for the children of her aunt and uncle. There she provided her cousins with a basic education and soon extended this to the poor children of the town. A young priest, Father Julian Tenison Woods, encouraged her to

continue this work, assuring her that educating the poor would be an ideal way to serve God.

In 1866 Mary and Fr. Julian founded Australia's first order of nuns, the Sisters of St. Joseph of the Sacred Heart, and also established St. Joseph's School in a converted stable in Penola, providing a free education to children from the area. In 1867 Mary took vows and became the first mother superior of the sisters. The following year the sisters opened schools in other Australian cities, as well as an orphanage and a refuge for women released from prison.

Mary intended that the order be self-governed and devoted to teaching and charity. She and Fr. Julian, who composed the rule for the order, insisted that the sisters would accept a life of total poverty, trusting in Divine Providence. Further, her school at Penola (SA) and the other schools that her order founded provided secular as well as religious education, regardless of the religious affiliation of the students, and accepted no money from the government, remaining open to all and accepting only what tuition parents could afford, at a time when the government still provided funding to religious schools. Some Australian priests and bishops were openly hostile both to the degree of autonomy that the Josephites enjoyed and to Mary's rejection of federal funding.

In 1871, perhaps intentionally misinformed by his advisers, Bishop Laurence Sheil of Adelaide excommunicated Mary for insubordination. The next year, however, on his deathbed, Sheil acknowledged that he might have been misled, and he reinstated Mary.

The remainder of Mary's career was marked by clashes with priests and bishops of the Australian church. After an 1873 meeting with Pope Pius IX, she won papal approval for the Josephite rule, with modifications that relaxed the degree of poverty imposed upon the sisters. MacKillop expanded the order's educational and charitable endeavours and attracted new sisters. In 1875 she was appointed superior general of the order. Despite her elevation, she continued to meet with hostility from a number of priests and bishops, and the sisters' work was circumscribed in certain cities. In 1885 she was removed as superior general, though she was reinstated in 1899 and remained at the head of the order until her death on 8<sup>th</sup> August, 1909 in North Sydney.

In June 1995 MacKillop was beatified by Pope John Paul II. In February 2010, after evaluating the testimony of an Australian woman who claimed that her terminal cancer had disappeared after she called upon MacKillop in prayer, Pope Benedict XVI recognized MacKillop as a saint. She was canonized that October. Today, there are about 800 Sisters of St Joseph, still working with the poor and marginalised in Australia, New Zealand, Timor Leste, Scotland, Ireland and Peru.
