FIRST READING – Genesis 2: 18-24

A reading from the book of Genesis

The Lord God said, 'It is not good that the man should be alone. I will make him a helpmate.' So from the soil the Lord God fashioned all the wild beasts and all the birds of heaven. These he brought to the man to see what he would call them; each one was to bear the name the man would give it. The man gave names to all the cattle, all the birds of heaven and all the wild beasts. But no helpmate suitable for man was found for him. So the Lord God made the man fall into a deep sleep. And while he slept, he took one of his ribs and enclosed it in flesh. The Lord God built the rib he had taken from the man into a woman, and brought her to the man. The man exclaimed:

'This at last is bone from my bones
and flesh from my flesh!

This is to be called woman,
for this was taken from man.'

This is why a man leaves his father and mother and joins himself to his wife, and they become one body.

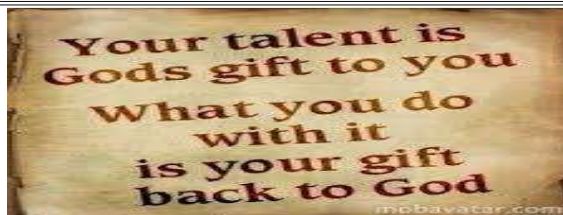
GOSPEL – Mark 9: 38-43, 45, 47-48

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark

Some Pharisees approached Jesus and asked, 'Is it against the law for a man to divorce his wife?' They were testing him. He answered them, 'What did Moses command you?' 'Moses allowed us' they said 'to draw up a writ of dismissal and so to divorce.' Then Jesus said to them, 'It was because you were so unteachable that he wrote this commandment for you. But from the beginning of creation God made them male and female. This is why a man must leave father and mother, and the two become one body. They are no longer two, therefore, but one body. So then, what God has united, man must not divide.' Back in the house the disciples questioned him again about this, and he said to them. 'The man who divorces his wife and marries another is guilty of adultery against her. And if a woman divorces her husband and marries another she is guilty of adultery too.'

People were bringing little children to him, for him to touch them. The disciples turned them away, but when Jesus saw this he was indignant and said to them, 'Let the little children come to me; do not stop them; for it is to such as these that the kingdom of God belongs. I tell you solemnly, anyone who does not welcome the kingdom of God like a little child will never enter it.' Then he put his arms round them, laid his hands on them and gave them his blessing.

The Celtic Cross on the Parish Sign

The Parish sign inside the church grounds and near to the entry shows the Celtic Cross alongside of the parish name with some differences. The Celtic Cross is known throughout the world as a symbol of Irish heritage. The connection is to be made immediately with Saint Kevin, a great Irish saint, who died in the 7th century. The Celtic Cross features a traditional cross accentuated with a circle around the intersection of the horizontal arms and the vertical stem. The circle, apart from being evocative of infinite love without beginning or end, there have also been those who have seen it as a depiction of the halo of Christ.

The Celtic Cross on the parish sign has a warm radiating centre, and its horizontal arms and vertical stem have a scalloped effect. Inspiration, in large part, has been taken from the Celtic Cross embedded in the Sacred Garden. The circular, glowing centre may be seen as symbolising Christ touching us all. While the scalloped effect may be seen as symbolising 'the many' – all who are disciples – on the cross of Christ.

We have all experienced the challenges of intermittent lockdowns throughout 2021 - perhaps it feels like there is a lot of Zoom and gloom - but there is light at the end of the tunnel ... Christmas Light! Hopefully Christmastime will see us celebrating with family and friends, enjoying the freedoms of no restrictions. And, of course, at St. Kevin's there is our annual Christmas Carols event, where we have the opportunity to share the message of Christmas – hope, love, light and life. Our Christmas Carols will go ahead somehow on 12 December 2021, but it can't happen without lots of input and assistance from parishioners. "So out of the ground the Lord God formed every beast of the field and every bird of the air, and brought them to the man to see what he would call them; and whatever the man called every living creature, that was its name." (Genesis 2:19)

The creation story reminds us of two important points. First, since the start, God has put the entire world into our care.
