

Faith Formation Sessions for our Children aged 5 – 17

Lovina Paul from Divine Kids, a Catholic organization based in Melbourne, dedicated to helping children engage with the Bible, will be running a 10-week programme beginning in Term 3 for **children aged 5-12**. These sessions aim to equip our children to grow spiritually by teaching them how to learn and apply the Word of God in their lives.



A new faith formation session will be starting for **children aged 13-17** in the parish. This will be 24 sessions in length and will run twice a month on the 1st Sunday and the 3rd Friday. I have brought together 10 youth to form a leadership team, 5 from the current senior youth and 5 youth in the parish over the age of 18.

The RCIA (Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults) is a process through which non-baptised men and women enter the Catholic Church and any baptised Christian who desires to, enters into full communion with the Catholic Church. They undergo a process of conversion as they study the Gospel, profess faith in Jesus and the Catholic Church, and receive the sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation, and Holy Eucharist.

Pope's Prayer Intention for July

For the pastoral care of the sick

The Mass – The Homily

Following the Gospel, we come to the homily. In the homily, a member of the clergy—a priest, deacon or bishop—explains a passage of Scripture and give practical applications.

The homily is a graced moment to share the faith. Christian friends may encourage us, correct us and cajole us in many circumstances. But the context of the Mass—the remembrance of Christ and his real presence—makes the homily a preeminent place for us to hear what we need to hear. In the homily, we learn and grow with help not only from the preacher, but from the Holy Spirit. It is the clear teaching of the Church that “the liturgical homily” holds “pride of place” among “all forms of Christian instruction” (see the *Catechism of the Catholic Church*, n. 132).

The great, living, apostolic tradition is ours to pass on to a generation that longs to be part of something good, life-giving and meaningful. So, the Church shares the faith in the spirit of the first Christians, who gathered to receive the Apostles’ teaching in the context of “the breaking of the bread and prayers” (Acts 2:42). The Church does so in the spirit of Jesus, who addressed synagogue gatherings (see Luke 4:16-20) and, on the day of his Resurrection, with the disciples at Emmaus, “interpreted to them what referred to him in all the Scriptures” (Luke 24:27).

The Apostles followed this pattern wherever they went. Later in the *Acts of the Apostles* (20:11), we find St Paul preaching to the Church’s assembly throughout the night, “until daybreak”.

Homilies today tend not to run on so long, but they are no less an important part of the Mass. Since so much in our culture changes so rapidly, it is essential that the teaching of Christ be applied to circumstances of our day in a way that allows the believer to see the full implications of the profession of faith.

Catholic faith is not merely about abstract points of theology. Nor is it something we dust off and wear for an hour on Sundays. It is a commitment of our whole life, and the homily shows how the faith applies to life—at home, at work, at leisure. As St Justin Martyr put it in AD 155: “When the reader has finished, he who presides over those gathered admonishes and challenges them to imitate these beautiful things.”

By explaining the Scriptures, “the homily, as an integral part of the liturgy, increases the Word’s effectiveness” (So we read in the Church’s General Instruction of the Roman Missal).

How does the preacher do that? The ways are as many and as varied as the personalities and interests of the preacher. One preacher may have a mastery of a wide variety of styles and approaches. The Church’s preachers learn from Jesus, whose sermons proceed by use of stories, analogies, commands, even confrontation. So it remains today: a homily can take many different forms. There was a time when moralising dominated homilies. Today, the challenge the priest faces is to use the homily not only to encourage his flock in the practice of the faith, but also to share with them the faith itself, the very content—the life-giving reality—of God’s Word.

Today’s preacher may also draw from a wealth of resources. The three-year cycle the lectionary provides may be richly integrated with the *Catechism of the Catholic Church* to touch on every aspect of our faith in a way that roots it in Scripture and relates it to daily life. Pope Benedict XVI laid out a clear plan for such teaching in his letter *Sacramentum Caritatis*: “The catechetical ... aim of the homily should not be forgotten. During the course of the liturgical year it is appropriate to offer the faithful, prudently and on the basis of the three-year lectionary, ‘thematic’ homilies treating the great themes of the Christian faith, on the basis of what has been authoritatively proposed by the Magisterium in the four ‘pillars’ of the *Catechism of the Catholic Church* ... , namely: the profession of faith, the celebration of the Christian mystery, life in Christ and Christian prayer.”

Still, the effect of the homily is not so much the work of the preacher as it is a work of the Spirit. So we may sometimes draw tremendous insights from a homily that was hastily prepared when Father was pressed for time because of all his parish duties, or when he was having a bad day. It is not about flash and dazzle. It is about our attentiveness to hear that “tiny whispering sound” (1 Kings 19:12) that is the word of God, speaking to our hearts, speaking through the ministry of others.

You may sometimes notice parishioners making the Sign of the Cross at the beginning or the end of the homily. This is a good, practical way of calling upon God’s help, to make the Word “actual”—to make the Word reside in our hearts.

At Emmaus, Jesus moved his gathering from the Word to the sacrament. After he opened up the Scriptures for the disciples, he made himself known to them “in the breaking of the bread”. As the Liturgy of the Word begins to draw to a close, the homily points in the direction of the rite we are about to celebrate: the Liturgy of the Eucharist.
