Privacy legislation requires the written permission of an authorised person before any name can be printed. Any list of the sick in the parish bulletin will undergo renewal according to a four-week cycle. After four weeks a person's name on the sick list will be removed. However, once again based on written permission of an authorized person the name can be re-added to the list.

The Great Amen

We have mentioned that only two Hebrew words have survived, untranslated, in common use in the Mass. One is Alleluia; the other is Amen. By this point in the Mass, we have already encountered the word Amen many times. It is the last word in most prayers [☩]a kind of prayerful punctuation. The word Amen completes a prayer. It signifies our consent to all the words that preceded it.

Jesus used it also as a preface to especially solemn teachings. He did this especially in connection with the doctrine of the Eucharist. Four times in his Bread of Life discourse in the sixth chapter of the Gospel of John you will find him pronouncing a double Amen.

Consider two examples:

“Amen, amen, I say to you, it was not Moses who gave the bread from heaven; my Father gives you the true bread from heaven.” (John 6:32)

“Amen, amen, I say to you, unless you eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink his blood, you do not have life within you.” (John 6:53)

Amen, in this sacred context, means “truly”. It means “I believe”. It means “yes”. In Jesus’ culture, it was pronounced as the affirmative of an oath. Those who pronounced it put their lives on the line. They committed themselves to a serious undertaking. They pledged their full and unreserved faith.

Curiously, it also means “Jesus”. In the Book of Revelation, we find an angel refer to Jesus as “the Amen, the faithful and true witness” (Revelation 3:14).

There are many Amens in the course of the Mass, but this is the great one because it follows the final doxology of the Eucharistic Prayer. We spoke a bit about doxologies in discussing the Gloria. The doxology usually serves as a finale to a prayer. In the case of the Church’s great prayer, the Eucharistic Prayer, the doxology is a grand finale indeed. The priest intones:

Through him, and with him, and in him, to you, O God, almighty Father, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, is all honour and glory, for ever and ever.

And those words call forth from all believers a Great Amen.

What is so great about our Amen? We find a clue in the ancient oracle of the Old Testament Prophet Malachi (1:11), who foresaw the day of our sacrifice and rejoiced:

For from the rising of the sun, even to its setting, my name is great among nations. And everywhere they bring sacrifice to my name, and a pure offering. For great is my name among the nations, says the Lord of hosts.

A few words of historical background may be helpful in talking about the Great Amen. There can be no doubt that the Christians of the earlier ages of the Church did not as clearly apprehend the precise moment of the change of the bread and wine upon the altar into the Body and Blood of Christ as we do now. They were satisfied to believe that the change was wrought in the course of the Eucharistic Prayer, a prayer made up of several elements, as we have seen—Preface, recitation of the words of institution, remembrance of the living and the dead, and so on—which prayer they nevertheless conceived of as one “action” or consecration, to which, after a doxology, they responded by a solemn “Amen”.

The essential unity of the Eucharistic Prayer is very clearly brought before us in the account of St Justin Martyr (AD 151), who, describing the Christian liturgy, says:

As soon as the common prayers are ended and they [the Christians] have saluted one another with a kiss, bread and wine and water are brought to the president, who receiving them gives praise to the Father of all things by the Son and Holy Spirit and makes a long thanksgiving for the blessings which he has vouchsafed to bestow upon them; and when he has ended the prayers and thanksgiving, all the people who are present forthwith answer with acclamation “Amen”.

The existing liturgies both of the East and the West clearly bear witness to this primitive arrangement.

In the Roman Liturgy, our liturgy, the Eucharistic Prayer, or “action”, of the Mass ends with the solemn doxology and Amen, which immediately precede the recitation of the Our Father.

Every high priest has been taken out of mankind and is appointed to act for men in their relations with God, to offer gifts and sacrifices for sins; and so he can sympathise with those who are ignorant or uncertain because he too lives in the limitations of weakness. That is why he has to make sin offerings for himself as well as for the people. No one takes this honour on himself, but each one is called by God, as Aaron was. Nor did Christ give himself the glory of becoming high priest, but he had it from the one who said to him: You are my son, today I have become your father, and in another text: You are a priest of the order of Melchizedek, and for ever.

Gospel Acclamation

Gospel –Mark 10:46-52

As Jesus left Jericho with his disciples and a large crowd, Bartimaeus (that is, the son of Timaeus), a blind beggar, was sitting at the side of the road. When he heard that it was Jesus of Nazareth, he began to shout and to say, 'Son of David, Jesus, have pity on me.' And many of them scolded him and told him to keep quiet, but he only shouted all the louder, 'Son of David, have pity on me.' Jesus stopped and said, 'Call him here.' So they called the blind man. 'Courage,' they said 'get up; he is calling you.' So throwing off his cloak, he jumped up and went to Jesus. Then Jesus spoke, 'What do you want me to do for you?' 'Rabbuni,' the blind man said to him 'Master, let me see again.' Jesus said to him, 'Go; your faith has saved you.' And immediately his sight returned and he followed him along the road.
